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# NURSING GRADUATE

Nursing graduate positions are available for students who have graduated but not yet passed the NCLEX exam. Upon licensure, title will change to registered nurse while continuing orientation.

Students who are offered this position begin orientation on the nursing unit they were hired to work. New graduates attend graduate nurse residency classes for their first six months and training on the nursing unit.

## DEACONESS GRADUATE NURSE RESIDENCY

The first year of nursing can be difficult for new graduates, affecting levels of confidence and comfort. It's vital to help new graduates minimize stress, develop critical thinking skills, and enhance effective communication. New graduates are paired with a preceptor to guide them through their first few months on a new unit.

Our nurse residency program has two phases that are completed over a six-month period to allow for a systematic transition.

- Phase I is delivered through New Nurse Orientation class and includes the basic standards of clinical practice, hands-on simulations, skill validation check-offs, quizzes, and case studies.
- Phase II enculturates residents in 24 hours of clinical practice development. Topics on integration into practice, patient safety and quality, end-of-life care, patient-centered care, self awareness, systems thinking, and leadership for staff nurses enable a transformation of mindset that promotes the vision of the organization's future requirements.
